Further Information on UA 333/07 (MDE 24/045/2007, 17 December 2007) - Incommunicado detention/ fear of torture or ill-treatment/ possible prisoners of conscience

On 17 December, peaceful advocates of political reform Walid al-Bunni and Yasser al-'Eiti were arrested and are reportedly held incommunicado without charge at State Security branch in Damascus. A total of seven political activists are now thought to be held by State Security and are at risk of torture and other ill-treatment. Amnesty International considers them to be probable prisoners of conscience, detained solely for their peaceful exercise of their right to freedom of expression and association.

Like the five others arrested between 9-17 December, Walid al-Bunni and Yasser al-'Eiti were arrested after taking part in a meeting on 1 December of a leading pro-democracy group, Damascus Declaration for Democratic National Change (DDDNC). The DDDNC is an unauthorised umbrella grouping comprising opposition and pro-democracy groups in Syria. A total of 40 DDDNC members were arrested, but the other 33 DDDNC members were released within a few days and no charges are known to have been brought against any of them.

Walid al-Bunni, Yasser al-'Eiti, Feda' al-Horani, Akram al-Bunni, Ahmad To'meh, Jabr al-Shoufi and 'Ali al-'Abdullah remain in detention, for reasons that are currently unclear. The Syrian authorities have given no reasons for their continuing imprisonment and, reportedly, they do not have access to legal counsel or contact with their families, increasing concern that they could be subject to torture or other ill-treatment.

Walid al-Bunni is a former prisoner of conscience. He was previously imprisoned for four years following an unfair trial before Supreme State Security Court (SSSC) for his involvement in the so-called "Damascus Spring", a pro-reform movement.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send appeals to arrive as quickly as possible, in English, Arabic, French or your own language:

- expressing concern at the arrest on 17 December of Walid al-Bunni and Yasser al-'Eiti;

- expressing concern that Feda' al-Horani, Akram al-Bunni, Ahmad To'meh, Jabr al-Shoufi, 'Ali al-'Abdullah, Walid al-Bunni and Yasser al-'Eiti are thought to be held in State Security branches, apparently on account of the peaceful exercise of their human rights;

- calling on the authorities to guarantee that the seven will not be tortured or ill-treated, and will be given immediate access to their relatives, lawyers and any medical treatment they may need;

- calling on the authorities to release them immediately and unconditionally if they are prisoners of conscience held solely for the peaceful expression of their opinions, or else brought to trial promptly and fairly on recognizably criminal charges, or released.
