UA 109/91 Fear of Torture in Prolonged 25 March 1991

Incommunicado Detention

TUNISIA: Sadiq Shourou

Mohammed Moncef Al Triqi Abdelaziz Al Buzouadi Mohammed Ben Salem

Amnesty International is concerned that four Tunisians, members or sympathizers of a non-recognized Islamic Group, are being held incommunicado in prolonged garde à vue detention and may be at risk of torture or ill-treatment.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Sadiq Shourou, a lecturer in the Faculty of Medicine at Tunis University, was arrested on 23 February 1991. He is said to be a sympathizer of the non-recognized Islamic group <u>Hizb al-Nahda</u> (Renaissance) and had previously been detained for three months and subsequently released without charge in 1987.

Mohammed Moncef Al Triqi, Head of the Tunis section of the Association for the Protection of Human Rights and Public Liberties and a member of $\underline{\text{Hizb}}$ al-Nahda, was arrested on 17 February 1991.

Abdelaziz Al Buzouadi, a former teacher working as journalist for $\underline{\text{Al-Fajr}}$, the weekly newspaper of $\underline{\text{Hizb al-Nahda}}$, was arrested on 23 February 1991. The newspaper $\underline{\text{Al-Fajr}}$ was ordered to close by the Tunisian Government on 8 February 1991.

Mohammed Ben Salem, a former lecturer in the Faculty of Agriculture in Tunis University - now working as an engineer - and a member of the legislative council of Hizb al-Nahda, was arrested on 24 February 1991.

The above named have now been held incommunicado in garde à vue detention well beyond the maximum 10-day period permitted under Tunisian law. Moreover, Tunisian law states that garde à vue detention must be renewed by the <u>Procureur de la République</u> (State Prosecutor) after four days; there is no evidence that this condition was complied with in any of these cases. Their families and lawyers have sought information of their whereabouts and legal status from the police and the Ministry of Interior but have not succeeded in obtaining any information.

Amnesty International is concerned that these people may be at risk of torture or ill-treatment, especially in light of the numerous reports of torture and ill-treatment in $\underline{\text{garde à vue}}$ detention received over the past few months. Since September 1990 several hundred supporters and suspected sympathizers of $\underline{\text{Hizb al-Nahda}}$ have been arrested, many of whom, especially those held in $\underline{\text{garde à vue}}$ detention beyond the 10-day legal period, have alleged that they were tortured or ill-treated in police custody.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Telegrams/telexes/faxes/express and airmail letters in French or Arabic if possible:

- expressing concern that Ali Asbai, Mohammed Moncef Al Triqi, Sadiq Shourou Abdelaziz Al Buzouadi and Mohammed Ben Salem have been held in prolonged \underline{a} \underline{a} \underline{vue} incommunicado detention, and that they are at risk of torture or \underline{ill} -treatment;
- asking the reason for their arrest and details of any charge or pending trial procedures against them;
- urging that if they are not charged with a recognizably criminal offence and promptly brought to trial, they should be released;
- urging the government to reveal their whereabouts and to allow them prompt access to legal counsel, to their families, and to medical care if necessary.
