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<u>INDIA: CHALLENGE TO GOVERNMENT TO SERIOUSLY ADDRESS 'DISAPPEARANCES' IN JAMMU AND KASHMIR AND PUNJAB</u>

Amnesty International is challenging the Indian Government to respond seriously to more than 200 cases of "disappearance" in Jammu and Kashmir and Punjab, following the issue of a disappointing response by the Indian Government to an Amnesty International publication in December.

"The government's response neither addresses the 200 cases of 'disappearance' in Jammu and Kashmir and Punjab that we raised in December, nor does it comment on our recommendations to stop the practice of 'disappearance'," the international human rights organization said.

According to Amnesty International, the government's response focuses more on political issues raised by Pakistan and others rather than responding to the grave human rights violations being committed by its security forces in the state.

"The government maintains that it has never been its intention to 'overlook, encourage, and much less, actually itself perpetrate human rights excesses,' but it shows little determination to halt them," said the organization.

Amnesty International is also repeating its call on the Indian Government to permit Amnesty International to visit Jammu and Kashmir.
