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ANY DIPLOMATIC MISSION TO HAITI MUST ADDRESS HUMAN RIGHTS VIOLATIONS

Amnesty International today urged Venezuela and Argentina to make sure human rights are high on the agenda of a possible diplomatic mission they may make to Haiti.

"This diplomatic mission should give a strong message to the de facto Haitian authorities that the continuing killings, 'disappearances' and torture must stop," Amnesty International said today in an appeal to these countries, which are two of the five governments in a group of nations known as the "Friends of the United Nations Secretary-General for Haiti."

The visit of the "Friends" group of nations could be crucial in resolving the crisis in Haiti, according to Amnesty International, which demands the "Friends" to make human rights an integral part of any diplomatic initiative.

"The need for an objective assessment of the ongoing severity of the human rights situation in Haiti is fundamental to the construction of a society in which human rights are respected," Amnesty International said. "We are therefore calling on any diplomatic mission to the country to consider long-term solutions to the human rights situation."

Another step in finding a long-term solution would be the return of human rights observers, including the UN/Organization of American States international civilian human rights observer mission and other observers, to monitor and report on any human rights violations in Haiti, Amnesty International said.

"We also call on any government who joins this diplomatic mission to publicly commit themselves to ensuring that all perpetrators of human rights violations in Haiti are tried in accordance with international standards for fair trials," the human rights organization said.

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
