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HUMAN RIGHTS CONCERNS ARE CENTRAL IN ANY INTERVENTION IN HAITI

With a possible invasion of Haiti looking more likely every day, Amnesty International called upon the United States and the international community to ensure full transparency during any military intervention in Haiti.

While Amnesty International neither supports nor condemns the invasion, the organization says it is essential that during this military operation there be a high degree of access for independent human rights observers.

Despite the difficulties in reporting on human rights violations by all parties in an armed conflict, it is vital that impartial information on allegations of human rights violations is quickly documented and released.

"There is a real risk that in the chaos that could ensue during a confrontation between an invasion force and the de facto Haitian military, innocent lives would be lost," Amnesty International said. "Only with monitors present in Haiti will the truth be known about what happens."

Amnesty International urged possible intervening forces that an independent human rights monitoring mission -- such as that by the United Nations and the Organization of American States, or by other international bodies -- should be allowed to undertake on-site monitoring of the human rights situation.

"In addition, all personnel involved in the military operation should report any human rights violations in Haiti that they witness or serious allegations they hear," Amnesty International said.

Also, all those responsible for human rights violations -- whether they are the former Haitian military leaders, personnel of the invading force, or Haitian civilians seeking reprisals -- should be brought to justice, Amnesty International said.

"The international community, including countries neighbouring Haiti, should guarantee that if the Haitian military leaders flee, they will be fully accountable for the killings, torture and "disappearances" committed during their bloody reign of terror," Amnesty International said.

Amnesty International reminds the governments who might be involved in an eventual multinational presence in Haiti that the serious abuse of human rights in Haiti is a long-term issue, which will require long-term solutions. "Building a society in which human rights are respected requires both a moral and financial commitment from any intervening nations." ENDS\
