Global conference on women's leadership on HIV/AIDS in Nairobi, Kenya

Violence against women and HIV/AIDS

Over 40 million people worldwide live with HIV/AIDS. Almost half are women and the number affected is increasing. Violence against women is a key factor in placing women at high risk of contracting the virus.

Violence against women increases risks of HIV infection:

- when women are subjected to sexual violence
- when women face violence for refusing sexual activity
- when girls are subjected to genital mutilation

Many women are exposed to sexual violence, inside and outside of marriage. Rape and other sexual violence during times of conflict is also helping to drive the AIDS pandemic as well as having damage consequences for health systems

Women face both the virus and discrimination.

Many lack access to information on the virus and how to prevent it, and to vital healthcare and medication. Social practices make it more difficult for women to take control of all areas of their lives. Denial of property and inheritance rights, employment and access to finance can cause women to be dependent on men. Exclusion from the participation in decision-making can leave women unable to act on issues which affect them.

Women taking action against the spread of HIV/AIDS

Despite these barriers, women are leading the fight against the AIDS pandemic. Grassroots activism by women, particularly those living with the virus, has grown in recent years with some striking successes.

Women call for action in the fight against HIV and AIDS

The International Women's Summit on 'Women's Leadership on HIV and AIDS' is now taking place in Nairobi. The meeting, which is hosted by the Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA), is the first ever global conference on women and HIV/AIDS, and aims to mobilize urgent responses to rising infection rates.

The conference brings together over 1500 women, and will include discussions on how to strengthen women's leadership in the fight against HIV/AIDS. The conference will also be attended by members of youth organizations, the UN, and over 500 women living with the virus.
