Amnesty International to publish 2008 global death penalty statistics

On Tuesday 24 March Amnesty International will publish its global death penalty statistics, looking at how many people were executed or sentenced to death across the world during 2008.

The report will include details on how the global totals are calculated, and tables on the number of executions carried out in per country between January and December 2008 as well as the number of death sentences passed. It concludes with some considerations on the death penalty figures and the challenges involved in uncovering accurate figures.

On the same day, Amnesty International will publish a report on the death penalty in Belarus, Ending executions in Europe: Towards abolition of the death penalty in Belarus, the last country in Europe to maintain the death penalty.

Key background facts from previous years are:

- At least 1,252 people were known to be executed in 24 countries during 2007. The true figure was certainly higher.
- At least 3,347 people were sentenced to death in 51 countries in 2007
- 138 countries have abolished the death penalty in law or practice.
- 59 countries retain and use the death penalty, most often as a punishment for people convicted of murder
