More journalists are reported to have been detained without charge or trial in a recent wave of arrests.

On 4 November 1997 Adetokunbo Fakeye, defence correspondent of PM News, a daily evening newspaper, was reportedly arrested and detained at Defence Headquarters in Lagos. On 8 November Jenkins Alumona, editor of The News magazine, was arrested at the Lagos studios of the state-owned television where he had just taken part in a program on sport. On 9 November Onome Osifo-Whiskey, managing editor of Tell Magazine, was arrested by armed security officers in Lagos as he drove to church with his children. On 14 November Nduka Obaigbena, editor-in-chief of This Day, was arrested in the new capital, Abuja, possibly in connection with a report about senior government officials close to the head of state. On 17 November Babafemi Ojudu, managing editor of The News newspaper group, was arrested on his return from a seminar in Kenya; he had earlier escaped arrest on 8 November.

Tell news magazine and The News newspaper group have been forced to operate in increasingly clandestine conditions under the present military government, but have remained critical of the annulment of the results of the 1993 presidential election and the government's current transition to civil rule program. In August 1993 Onome Osifo-Whiskey was among four senior Tell editors detained incommunicado and without charge for 12 days for publishing articles critical of the government. Babafemi Ojudu was detained in July 1995, when he was reportedly beaten, held in an airless cell, and deprived of medical care and regular food before being released without charge after 10 days. Kunle Ajibade, editor of The News, and George Mbah, assistant editor of Tell, are serving 15 years' imprisonment in harsh conditions after being convicted of treason in grossly unfair trials by a secret military tribunal in 1995. Nosa Igiebor, editor-in-chief of Tell, was detained incommunicado and without charge or trial for six months from December 1995.

In September 1997, following reports in *The News* and *Tell* that the head of state, General Sani Abacha, was seriously ill, armed soldiers and police sought the magazines' editors. They briefly detained and threatened Nosa Igiebor's wife, journalists, administrative staff and vendors, and seized copies of the magazine to prevent distribution first in Abuja, and more recently in Lagos. In the days before his arrest Onome Osifo-Whiskey had publicized a hit-list of 22 *Tell* staff which had been sent anonymously to the magazine's offices.

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/faxes/express/airmail letters in English or in your own language:

- expressing concern at the arrest of more journalists (naming some or all);

- asking why they were arrested and continue to be held in detention without charge or trial;
- expressing concern that they may be subjected to ill-treatment in detention, and urging that they be given immediate access to their families, lawyers and doctors of their own choice;
- expressing concern that they may be prisoners of conscience and calling for their immediate and unconditional release if they are not to be charged with recognizably criminal offences and promptly and fairly tried.
