Thabo Sejanamane, Themba Gwabeni, Nomvula Hlongwane, Ephraim Motoko, Gordon Kgamanyane and Johannes "Jones" Molefe were released uncharged by the Bophuthatswana police at about 5 pm on 18 August 1993. They had been on hunger-strike for two days in protest at their detention, but their health is reported to be satisfactory. They were not tortured or assaulted in custody.

Over the weekend of 14 and 15 August lawyers acting for the detainees tried repeatedly to gain access to their clients, but the police refused to say where the detainees were being held or to allow access to them. On 17 August the lawyers were granted access for consultations with their clients, and prepared a court application for their release. Before the application was heard in court, all six were released on 18 August. The police had confirmed that Thabo Sejanamane was detained under the terms of Bophuthatswana's Internal Security Act, and it appears the other five were detained under the same provisions, but no official reasons have been given for these detentions. The detentions appear to have been an effort to obstruct the human rights work of the Mafikeng Anti-Repression Forum (MAREF), in which Ephraim Motoko as well as Thabo Sejanamane is involved, as well as the work of the ANC branch in Mafikeng.

On 14 August 1993, during the course of ANC efforts to present a petition to the South African government's representative in Mafikeng, the Bophuthatswana police arrested about 23 people and held them from about midday to 6.30 pm when they were released uncharged. Representatives from the ANC branch in Kimberley, northern Cape Province, were removed from the Mafikeng area under police escort.

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send a final round of express and airmail letters in English or your own language:

- welcoming the unconditional release on 18 August 1993 of the six detainees named above; requesting to know the reasons why they were detained;
- expressing concern that some 23 people at an ANC march in Mafikeng on 14 August 1993 were held in police custody for about six hours before being released uncharged. Requesting to be informed of the reason and legal basis for their detention;

- urging the Bophuthatswana authorities to repeal the provisions of the Bophuthatswana Internal Security Act which effectively provide for the imprisonment of people solely for the non-violent exercise of their fundamental human rights;
- urging the South African authorities to use all possible influence to bring about the repeal of these same provisions.
