The men named above are reported to have been arrested between 18 and 24 June 1996 on suspicion of being political opponents of the Sudan Government. They have not been brought to court or charged and are currently in detention in a Sudan Security-run section of Kober Prison, Sudan's main prison located in Khartoum North. There are reports that some of the detainees have been beaten. Amnesty International is concerned that they are possible prisoners of conscience and that they are at risk of ill-treatment.

The arrests appear to be part of a round-up of suspected opponents of the government following a public challenge to the authorities issued by the National Democratic Alliance, an umbrella grouping of banned political parties and trade unions, on 10 June 1996. This challenge, which was signed by leading political opponents living inside Sudan, called on the government to step down in favour of an interim administration.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/express/airmail letters in English, Arabic or your own language:

- expressing concern at the detention without charge of these $15\ \mathrm{men}$, who may be prisoners of conscience imprisoned for their suspected opposition to the Sudan Government;
- asking assurances that they are not being ill-treated;
- urging that they be given immediate and regular access to their families, legal representatives and any necessary medical attention;
- appealing for them to be released if they are not to be charged with recognizably criminal offences and brought promptly to a fair trial.
