Ufuk Gürbüz and Tufan Gürbuz were formally arrested on 19 October 1990.

From Mucadele

Figen Baran and Metin Türker have been released. Nail Çavu_ was formally arrested on 19 October 1990.

No details of charges are available, since no indictment has yet been prepared.

Lawyers representing those in detention went to the State Prosecutor to gain permission to see their clients. Permission was granted for access of 10 minutes. When the lawyers went to the police headquarters they were denied access, and returned to the Prosecutor's office. They were told that the Prosecutor could take no further action.

Many of those released after detention report that they were tortured while in detention, and were subjected to electric shocks, being suspended by their arms, and sprayed with water under high pressure, and are intending to submit complaints supported by medical certificates to the State Prosecutor.

No further action is necessary. Thanks to all those who sent appeals on their behalf.
