According to a report in the 15 November 2003 edition of Tehran's *Kayhan* newspaper, seven women, about whom no further details are provided, were each sentenced to 50 lashes by a general Court in Shiraz, south central Iran, for showing disrespect, (in Persian, *hormat shekan*), to the "holy month of Ramadan"

The women were reportedly driving around the streets of Shiraz, listening to loud music, "dancing in the vehicle" and ridiculing those fasting during the month of Ramadan, which is currently underway. Their behaviour aggravated citizens, who made repeated calls to a special police line in order to quickly halt them.

Following their arrest, they reportedly confessed and were sentenced to 50 lashes each. It is not known when the sentence is scheduled to be carried out or whether an appeal has been lodged at this stage.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Amnesty International considers the punishment of flogging to constitute cruel, inhuman and degrading treatment amounting to torture, in contravention of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR) to which Iran is a state party. This year alone, the organisation has recorded 190 floggings as having been carried out in Iran, although true figures may be much higher. In 1997 the United Nations commission on human rights stated that "corporal punishment [such as flogging] can amount to cruel, inhuman or degrading punishment, or even to torture".

On 18 November Canada introduced a draft United Nations (UN) resolution on the situation of human rights in Iran, to the third committee of the United Nations General Assembly. The draft resolution explicitly refers to the practice of flogging, in point d of section 2, in which it expresses serious concern at "The use of torture and other forms of cruel, inhuman and degrading punishment, in particular the practice of amputation and flogging".

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send appeals to arrive as quickly as possible, in Persian, English, French or your own language:

- recognizing the rights and responsibilities of states to bring to justice those suspected of criminal offences;

- expressing concern at the report that seven women have been sentenced to flogging;
- urging the authorities to commute the sentence of flogging;

- noting that Iran is a state party to the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR). Article 7 of the ICCPR states that "No one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment";

- urging the judicial authorities to implement a moratorium on the use of flogging, which is a cruel, inhuman and degrading punishment, with a view to its eventual abolition
