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Sudan: Rape as a weapon of war

Five to six men would rape us, one after the other, for hours during six days, every night. My husband could not forgive me after this, he disowned me."

The mass rapes ongoing in Darfur are war crimes and crimes against humanity, but very little is being done to stop them.

Amnesty International's report: *Sudan: Rape as a weapon of war* demonstrates that despite the regional and international focus on Darfur and promises by the Sudanese government to disarm the Janjawid militia, there is still no protection for women and girls.

The suffering and abuse endured by these women goes far beyond the actual rape. Rape has a devastating and ongoing impact on the health of women and girls. The survivors now face a lifetime of stigma and marginalisation from their own families and communities. Women and girls are being attacked, not only to dehumanize the women themselves, but also to humiliate, punish, control, terrorize and displace women and to persecute the community to which they belong.

Amnesty International is therefore calling for Sudanese government forces and the Janjawid militia to bring an immediate halt to the use of rape as a weapon of war. Government officials and militia leaders should publicly condemn rape by their combatants. The responsible authorities should set up mechanisms to ensure the protection of civilians.

It is vital that the Janjawid militia, consistently accused of atrocities including widespread sexual violence, is disarmed and disbanded at once. Its members should be deprived of any opportunity to renew their attacks.

Amnesty International believes that an international Commission of Inquiry should be established to investigate war crimes and crimes against humanity in Darfur, as well as allegations of genocide.

The perpetrators of attacks on the women and girls of Darfur should be brought to justice. Their trials should be fair and open, while excluding the death penalty or inhuman punishments such as amputations, and ensuring the safety of victims and witnesses.
