Juvénal Niyonzima and Michel Manirambona have not been seen since they were arrested in the Cibitoke area of the capital, Bujumbura, on 26 September 1999, reportedly by soldiers on patrol. Amnesty International is especially concerned for their safety following reports that Léovin Nzeyimana, who "disappeared" after soldiers arrested him on 19 September, was extrajudicially executed shortly after his arrest and buried in a secret grave.

Amnesty International had been investigating the possible "disappearance" of Léovin Nzeyimana, who was on his way home when he was arrested by soldiers based in the Kamenge area of Bujumbura. The organization has now been reliably informed that Léovin Nzeyimana was extrajudicially executed by the soldiers a few hours after his arrest, at around 3am on 20 September, and that he was buried in a secret graveyard in Kamenge. The graveyard is reported to be near the Nyabagere river, on 6th Avenue, which separates the districts of Heha and Gikizi. First reports suggest that up to 15 bodies may be buried there; their identities are not known.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Bujumbura has recently been frequently attacked by armed opposition groups, who have deliberately and arbitrarily killed civilians. Since these attacks on the capital increased in August 1999, the security forces have made scores of arrests, and Amnesty International has received several reports of torture and "disappearance". Since mid-September, the area surrounding Bujumbura has been virtually cleared of civilians, who have been moved into temporary camps where they are held in appalling conditions, while the army carries out counter-insurgency operations.

More than 9,000 civilians, mostly Hutu, are held in various prisons and detention centres around Burundi. The majority are held without charge or trial, and many people are arrested on the basis of denunciation.

- calling for urgent investigations to be carried out to establish the whereabouts of Juvénal Niyonzima and Michel Manirambona;
- calling for urgent investigations into the arrest, "disappearance" and possible extrajudicial execution of Léovin Nzeyimana;
- calling for reports that a number of bodies may have been secretly buried in the Kamenge area to be immediately investigated to establish whether they are well-founded;
- calling for those found to have committed or condoned grave human rights violations to be brought to justice.
