Amnesty International has learned that both Sylvanus Kanyako and David Kamara were released shortly after 13 February 1998, when Nigerian troops of the West African force deployed in Sierra Leone entered Freetown, forcing the ruling Armed Forces Revolutionary Council (AFRC) from power.

Sylvanus Kanyako and David Kamara had been detained for more than a month. They were arrested on 10 January after an article published in the *Herald Guardian* suggested that a prominent member of the AFRC should be arrested in connection with the looting of the Iranian Embassy in Freetown in late December 1997.

Both men were tortured and ill-treated while in detention. Sylvanus Kanyako is reported to have sustained serious injuries from having his arms tied tightly behind his back.

Anthony Swaray had earlier been released without charge on 21 January 1998.

The government of President Ahmad Tejan Kabbah, which was overthrown by the AFRC in a military coup in May 1997, is now returning to Freetown.
