'Izzat Mirghani Taha Khalifa Khader Kemair Kamal Abu al-Gassim

Hamuda al-Sheikh - released

'Izzat Mirghani Taha, Khalifa Khader Kemair, and Kamal Abu al-Gassim, are reported to still be in detention. They were arrested with several others on 10 March 1994 during a gathering to commemorate the anniversary in the Islamic calendar of the summary execution of 28 army officers on 24 April 1990.

Amnesty International has received information that the three are being held in small unventilated cells with no windows, and that they are being subjected to ill-treatment. It seems that they are being made to sleep on the floor, have to ask for permission for water and have been denied a change of clothing since their arrest. There are fears that they may be at risk of beatings and torture. Their place of detention is still unknown.

Amnesty International has received confirmation that Hamuda al-Sheikh was released on 17 March. His health apparently deteriorated in custody as he was denied medicine he needed following an eye operation he had undergone before his arrest. As with those released on 16 March (see follow-up AFR 54/08/94, 17 March), Hamuda al-Sheikh was made to sign an undertaking which prohibits him from taking part in gatherings, opposing the government in the future, and which bars him from leaving Khartoum without prior permission from the authorities.

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/express and airmail letters either in English or Arabic, or in your own language:

- expressing concern at the continuing detention of 'Izzat Mirghani Taha, Khalifa Khader Kemair and Kamal Abu al-Gassim who were arrested on 10 March 1994 and who Amnesty International believes are prisoners of conscience imprisoned solely for exercising their internationally recognised rights to freedom of expression and association;
- seeking information about the reasons for their continuing detention;
- requesting assurances that they are not being subjected to torture or ill-treatment and urging that their whereabouts in custody be made public and that they are granted immediate and regular access to their family, legal counsel and any necessary medical attention;
- urging that they be immediately and unconditionally released;
- welcoming the release of the other individuals who were arrested on 10 March.
