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UA 176/91 Fear of Torture/Fear of "Disappearance" 21 May 1991

PERU: Marcela VALDEZ DE LA CRUZ, 35-year-old teacher (f)

Amnesty International is seriously concerned for the physical safety of a teacher and mother of two children, Marcela Valdez de la Cruz, who is a member of the <u>Sindicato Unico de Trabajadores en la Educación</u> (SUTEP), the Educational Workers Trade Union.

She was reportedly detained on 17 May 1991 by members of the <u>Policía</u> <u>Técnica</u>, the investigative police, on leaving her home in the La Magdalena area of the city of Ayacucho, Ayacucho department.

According to reports, the detention of Marcela Valdez was acknowledged by the police until 20 May, when relatives were informed that she had been transferred to the "Los Cabitos" military barracks.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

For the last eight years Amnesty International has received numerous reports of incommunicado and unacknowledged detentions from Peru, some of which have led to "disappearances". Most of them have occurred in rural areas and have been carried out by uniformed members of the security forces, who often refuse to acknowledge the detentions. Many of those detained by the armed forces "disappear" indefinitely; others are released after days or weeks in secret custody, during which time they may be subjected to torture. Sometimes their detention is acknowledged, after prolonged secret detention and interrogation. In these cases, detentions are only acknowledged to have occurred as of the date the detainees are transferred from military to police custody, when public prosecutors are informed of the detention. The armed forces as a rule never acknowledge having held prisoners prior to their transfer to the police. This is a major contributing factor to the continuing practice of torture and "disappearance".

Human rights violations take place in a context of increasingly violent activities by armed opposition groups, especially <u>"Sendero Luminoso"</u>, which has claimed responsibility for hundreds of execution-style killings of government officials, leaders of left-wing political parties and members of peasant communities believed to have cooperated with the armed forces.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Telegrams/telexes/faxes and airmail letters:

- expressing concern for the physical safety of Marcela Valdez de la Cruz and asking that, while held in detention, she be given access to relatives, a doctor and a lawyer;

- requesting that she be brought before a competent judicial authority within the term provided for by law.
