Police opened fire on a protest march in Maharashtra, western India, on 25 June, killing three people and injuring 37. Fifteen *adivasi* (also known as tribal) activists were arrested and charged with the attempted murder of a policeman and attempt to commit arson. Amnesty International believes the charges are without foundation, part of a pattern of harassment of *adivasis* campaigning for land rights, and fears that all 15 are at risk of torture or ill-treatment.

The protest march, or morcha, was organised by Adivasi Bhoomi Hakka Andolan (Tribal Land Rights Movement). The adivasis face widespread discrimination and torture in police custody. The march took place after a local politician accused of assaulting an adivasi girl was released on bail from the police station in Puntamba village, Kopargaon district. The protesters claimed that he had attempted to rape the girl, but the police registered the attack as the lesser offence of molestation. Apparently some 250-300 adivasis, mostly women and children, marched to the police station to protest. Though exact events remain unclear, according to reports a scuffle broke out between Indu Manjare and the local Assistant Sub Inspector: he physically assaulted her, and other adivasis who saw this started throwing stones. Police opened fire and according to eyewitnesses, they picked out two leaders of the Adivasi Bhoomi Hakka Andolan, Pradeep Dushing and Indu Manjare, and shot them at close range as they ran away.

The police have alleged that the protesters were carrying knives and stones, and had attempted to set fire to the police station with kerosene. They claim that the protesters also tried to set fire to the local police Assistant Sub-Inspector, and have charged the 15 marchers they arrested with attempting to murder him. The protesters deny this. The government of Maharashtra have apparently ordered an inquiry into the police shooting but activists are pressing for a judicial inquiry.

Another Adivasi Bhoomi Hakka Andolan activist, John Abraham, was arrested the day after the march when he came to the police station to enquire about his wife, who was one of the 14 people detained. He had apparently been 120km away in Aurangabad at the time of the march, but he too has been charged with the attempted murder of the policeman and conspiracy to commit arson.

The protesters in custody have reportedly been kept handcuffed in their cells, which is violates a Supreme Court ruling.

The three women arrested were apparently remanded to prison on 28 June, while the 12 men were remanded to police custody. Those in police custody are particularly vulnerable to torture.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

There are over 70 million adivasis in India, around eight per cent of the population. After independence in 1947, India made special provisions to protect their rights, enacting special legislation to protect areas of adivasi land from encroachment. However, their traditional community rights have come under

pressure from powerful interests in a country where there is intense competition for land and resources. Illegal occupation of land traditionally owned by adivasis is made easier by the fact that adivasis often do not possess land records and much of their land is communally owned.

Tension has been mounting in Kopargaon district because of a dispute over a piece of land owned by the Maharashtra State Farming Corporation (MSFC). Landless adivasis have been living on the part of the land not under MSFC cultivation, and the Maharashtra government had been planning to redistribute this surplus land among landless adivasis. An activist has alleged that the land has now been handed over to a public sector company that was set up by the MSFC to stop the land being handed over to the adivasis. Adivasis have recently increased their campaign for their rights over this land.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send appeals to arrive as quickly as possible, in English or your own language:

- urging the Government of Maharashtra to guarantee the safety of those detained on 25 June at the police station in Puntamba village, Kopargaon district, and asking for them to be granted immediate access to their families;
- expressing concern that police opened fire on the 25 June protest march, killing three and injuring 37;
- noting that the Government of Maharashtra has ordered an inquiry into the police shooting but urging that a judicial inquiry is conducted that is fully independent and impartial, and that its findings are made public in full;
- urging the authorities to suspend those responsible for ordering the shooting so that they are removed from any position of influence over victims or witnesses to the incident and to protect witnesses from any harassment and intimidation.
