Amnesty International has received reports that the four men mentioned above have been tortured. Following their arrest on 17 June and their interrogation they were taken to Tora Penitentiary in the early hours of 18 June. They were allegedly put in a small cell and were forced to take off their clothes and were left standing in their underwear. Then they were tortured by security officers reportedly for about four hours. They were made to face the wall while being kicked, beaten with a stick and whipped. They were said to have lost consciousness at times but the beating continued. They were then immediately transferred to the High Security Prison in Tora (commonly known as the Scorpion Prison), where detainees, mostly alleged members of illegal Islamist groups, have had no access to lawyers and families since December 1993 following a ban imposed by the Ministry of the Interior. There they were held in a very small cell, isolated from other detainees.

The four men's lawyers and families did not know their whereabouts until 19 June, but they were unable to visit them that day because of the ban. However, Hamdein Sabbahi's wife, Siham Nagm, obtained permission to visit her husband on 21 June. She saw marks of torture on her husband's body. After he had told her about what had happened she alerted local human rights organizations and journalists and she lodged a complaint with the Public Prosecutor's Office. The Egyptian Organization for Human Rights, the Centre for Human Rights Legal Aid and the Journalists' Syndicate all lodged complaints with the Ministry of the Interior and the Public Prosector's Office protesting about the alleged torture of the four men and calling for an investigation as well as for their immediate release.

On 23 June the four people were brought to the Public Prosecutor's Office and were questioned in connection with their alleged torture. They were promised to be referred to forensic medical doctors on 24 June.

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express/airmail letters in English, French, Arabic or in your own language:

- calling for the immediate and unconditional release of the four people mentioned above who are held as prisoners of conscience;
- expressing deep concern about their alleged torture;
- urging that a prompt, thorough and impartial investigation be carried out into the allegation of torture, that the methods and findings of this investigation be made public and that anyone implicated in perpetrating the torture against the four people be brought to justice without delay;

- seeking assurances that the four men are protected from any form of torture and ill-treatment, and that they have access to their lawyers, families and to medical care.
